Preparation

Grading Policy

Your child's grade will be based on the following:

•Assessments and Writing Pieces – 45% of grade

•Classwork—25% of grade

•Homework - 15% of grade

•Participation and Effort - 15% of grade.

Units of Study & Curriculum

PS/MS 161 utilizes the rigorous curriculum supplied by Teachers' College. The 7th grade and 8th grade curriculums in English Language Arts will focus on key areas to supplement our students in the skills needed to become exemplar readers and writers. For the months of September and October our 7th grade classes will focus on port their reading. They will read Independent Author Studies (reading component) and Writing Realistic Fiction: Symbolism, Syntax and Truth (writing component).

Our 8th graders will focus on Reading Analytically across Genres-Recognizing Archetypes, Allusions and Arguments (reading gies to improve their writing.

component) and Investigative Journalism (writing component).

Students will participate daily in Reader's and Writer's Workshops. In Reader's Workshop, students will be taught about different features and learn reading comprehension strategies to supindependently in class daily where they will get a chance to practice these strategies and look at author's craft. They will have a daily sharer session where they will get a chance to discuss their learning with others. In Writer's Workshop, students will learn craft lessons and writing strateThrough these studies, students will read and write across a variety of text types and become involved in book discussion groups, learning how to respond to a variety of texts. We will also celebrate your child's work by posting around our classroom. We will be sure to update you on any changes and upcoming projects, and welcome your help and support with our students!

•Make sure that your child reads books from a variety of genres including: realistic fiction, mystery, science fiction, fantasy, historical fiction, myth, legend, fairy tale, folk tale, horror, biography, autobiography, newspapers, magazines, feature articles, nonfiction, etc.

•Limit television viewing . •Encourage your child to get adequate amounts of sleep. Recent brain research has determined that

children between the ages of 12-18 need an average of nine and a half hours of sleep a night in order to grow and function properly in school. •Please check that your child is doing homework on a daily basis.

•Please check that your child is proofreading his/her work but please do not do this for him/her. Your child needs to practice these skills in order to become an independent learner and writer.

•Have reading materials available

in the house to send the message that reading is important.

•Make sure that your child has a quiet place in which to read and a daily routine that includes reading and homework.

•Please ask your child on a regular basis for school notices that might have been sent home.

•It is helpful to discuss what your child is reading with him/her. This offers support and encouragement for your child to read. Your child's understanding of what he/she is reading will improve through discussion.
